With the expected 'railway' decor, the beers were perfect and good speedily served Black Country food with which to soak up that wonderful liquid, made for a very quickly passing couple of hours.

Then it was onward to the Sarah Hughes establishment. The Beacon Hotel at Sedaly. This particularly suited me, as my height, or lack of it allowed me the distinction of being the only one not have to stoop to see through the serving hatch.

The Victorian pub with its own brewery at the rear was another delight as was the superb Ruby Mild on offer.

The pub and beer pales by comparison with whats gone before and not begrudgingly I clamber aboard our bus for the last time and its home we go.


